#### **OVERVIEW**

#### **Agency Overview**

The State Board of Career Colleges and Schools (SCR) monitors and regulates Ohio's private, for-profit, post-secondary career colleges and schools in order to ensure compliance with state law. SCR establishes the rules for the registration and operation of the schools, including standards to ensure a school's financial stability, sound business practices, and adequate programs and curricula. It also investigates and resolves consumer complaints and maintains funds and records to assist students when schools close. All of SCR's operations are funded through fee revenue generated through its registrations; the Board receives no General Revenue Fund (GRF) funding.

SCR's governing authority consists of eight members: the Superintendent of Public Instruction or designee, the Chancellor of Higher Education or designee, and six members appointed by the Governor, one of whom (the member representing students) is nonvoting. The day-to-day operations of SCR are the responsibility of an executive director, who is appointed by the eight-member governing authority. Including the Executive Director, SCR has three full-time staff members. In addition, SCR contracts with four part-time school evaluators who are based around the state and perform SCR's fieldwork and onsite visits.

#### **Operating Expenses (233601)**

SCR has one line item that funds its activities, which include the registration and approval of schools, programs, degrees, and majors; onsite visits and investigative inquiries by part-time paid consultants and staff; and the provision of permits for school agents. In FY 2017, approximately 250 career colleges and schools were registered with SCR. These schools offered nearly 1,800 programs and enrolled over 40,000 students. SCR is also responsible for responding to complaints about schools and for maintaining the Ohio Student Tuition Recovery Fund. SCR is a non-GRF supported entity, with all of its operations funded through fee revenue generated through school and program registrations.

In January 2017, SCR established an online Student Consumer Information Course to meet a student disclosure requirement that was previously met using a paper form. The fee for the course is \$25, which was assessed to the student. The budget, instead, requires a registered college or school to pay the disclosure fee for new students, and prohibits it from charging a student for that fee, either directly or through any increase in fees or tuition charged to a student to pay the disclosure fee. It also requires SCR to refund all student disclosure fees it collected from the colleges and schools since January 2017 for purposes of refunding that money to students who were charged that fee by the college or school.

The budget also requires the Chancellor of Higher Education to prepare a transferability strategy plan that enables students to transfer credits from a for-profit career college or school to a state institution of higher education without unnecessary duplication or institutional barriers. The Chancellor is required to submit an interim strategy plan by July 1, 2018, and a final strategy plan by January 1, 2019, to the Governor, President and Minority Leader of the Senate, and Speaker and Minority Leader of the House.
